As I write my last article for The Tie, I am reflecting on the almost five years that I have been in this position – the challenging times and the life-giving times. I am grateful for the opportunity to work alongside a very committed and capable

group of women. I am better because of the experiences and opportunities I have had. I am humbled by God's faithfulness to me and to NABWU as we, together, sought to make a difference in a hurting world. God gives us experiences and opportunities, not only for ourselves, but to share with those who will come behind us. So, what are some 'words of wisdom' that I would offer?

There are some things, more important than others. In Leadership Legacies: Lessons for Christian Women Leaders, Alma Hunt writes: "The Secret of the Christian Leader is her relationship with Jesus Christ. A Christian woman in leadership will often be nearly overwhelmed. But in Christ she will know to 'cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you.' No matter how many other things have to be done, a leader needs time each day to rest in the Lord, to be in prayer, to renew relationship with the highest power, and to 'grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ." I have found that prayer first and last - and, many moments in between have equipped me with the strength, courage and confidence to be in leadership. Time to renew myself physically, emotionally, and spiritually has helped me to do as Paul told Timothy (1 Timothy 5:20) 'to guard what has been entrusted to your care.' True Christian Leadership is a condition of the heart. When your heart is 'in tune' with God; when your heart 'is in' what you are leading; when you've spent time asking for God's leadership and guidance. . .you will gain the ability to be vulnerable; you'll gain an extra portion of confidence - you will be prepared and empowered.

Be assured that those leaders, in the North American Baptist Women's Union, who have gone before you are cheering you on, praying for you and watching to see what God will do through you.

To my Sister in Christ,

I am so grateful for your willingness to be used by God in this NABWU leadership role. As you embark upon this journey, I would like to share three thoughts with you.

Enrich your faith: You will have a myriad of experiences, from busyness to blessings with much in between. Always remember to honor and cultivate your relationship with God. Do not allow busyness to crowd Him out, nor blessings to pass without acknowledging their Source. Meditate on His Word. Rest. Speak less. Hear from Him. Draw from His strength. Ask for wisdom and discernment. Be adventurous. Stretch yourself as you encounter God outside of your little corner of the world. Rest. Be willing. Be available. Turn words into actions. Confess your shortcomings. Learn from mistakes. Rest. Walk with Him. Run with Him. Look for Christ. Discover Him in the faces of others. Be thankful. Respond with acts of mercy. Rest. Bask in His glory and grace.

Exercise flexibility: It has been said, "there is no 'I' in team." Each team member will have her own thoughts, ideas, dreams, expectations and limitations. Backgrounds, geography, culture, and even practical expression of what it means to be "Baptist" will vary. On a team, the unexpected will happen, opinions will differ, approaches will be multiple, so flexibility is crucial. "My way or the highway" only leads to a bitter, lonely journey. As a Christ-follower, you are to look to the interests of others (Philippians 2:3,4). When prayerful, thoughtful input is accompanied with flexibility, greater things are accomplished for Him.

Engage in fellowship: You will be given many opportunities to fellowship with Baptist women across North America and around the world. But fellowship is not the pleasantries exchanged over a cup of tea. True fellowship stems from your relationship with God and is expressed in your deeper moments with others: hearing their heart cries, offering encouraging words, and following through on your promises to help. It is a coming alongside, a sharing of burdens. Fellowship includes praying: with your teammates, through challenges, over those serving the vulnerable, and for our global Baptist sisters in an informed and involved manner. Although fellowship requires commitment and action, it is also where you will encounter your greatest joys. "Together We Are Stronger" is fulfilled when we engage in fellowship. As you enter this journey, be bold, have a blast, and be blessed.

We gathered with over 9000 women from around the world in March, at the United Nations in New York for the Commission on the Status of Women. This year's theme was "Women's Economic Empowerment in the World of Work." Hundreds of sessions were available, discussing solutions to women's issues that we are facing everywhere.

This year, the Baptist World Alliance Women's Department had the biggest contingent we have ever had of 25 Baptist women, with eighteen coming from outside the U.S, and thirteen countries represented. For the first time ever, the full BWA Women's Department Executive Board (minus one) came to experience, learn and grow together! It was a most rewarding time!

ASI think about the new venture that NABWU has assumed, this verse continues to come to my mind. God has been gracious beyond our imagining as NABWU has endeavored to engage a younger audience. Not only have things fallen into place, like people, places and financial resources; but also the encouragement we've received while hoping for a better future because of the young women we are investing in. If you've been paying attention to The Tie, viewing our website, or talking with leadership on the NABWU Board, you would have noticed the significant endeavor to engage a younger generation — for missions and ministry and leadership potential.

In March of 2016 the Reverend Dr. John P. Chandler, Leader of Spence Network, spoke to our Executive Board with the intent of helping NABWU understand how to grapple with reaching another generation for Kingdom purposes. The Spence Network is about "Investing intensively in the discipleship and leadership capacity of select, high-ability, young adult leaders to equip them for decades of servant leadership in congregations and communities." They do this through a process called Uptick, "a mentoring-based track where young adults are discipled by investing spiritual, relational, time/space, intellectual, and financial capitals in their lives. The term 'uptick' means "an asset that appreciates with investment." How amazing is that?

Out of numerous conversations and prayer, the idea of Uptick NABWU was planted. As remote as it was, the possibility of NABWU partnering with the Spence Network to provide a year-long 'journey' for young women to learn from and engage leadership in Baptist life, it has come to fruition!

Between 8-12 young women will spend several days, three times during the year in face-to-face conversation. They will



also spend about 90-plus minutes in 'Huddles' through the blessing of technology — learning from, encouraging each other through challenges, praying together and for each other — while building community. The goal finding within themselves a greater giftedness, a greater potential and a greater possibility for Kingdom living.

Partnering with Spence Network (under the leadership and 'cheerleading' of John Chandler) we will also be partnering with Truett Seminary, in Waco, TX and Gary Nelson of Toronto. Many 'silent partners' have invested significant sums of money to make this happen. All of the NABWU Uptickers will be receiving scholarships. We don't have all the funds we need; but we have more than enough capital, more than enough promise of leadership and more than enough young women to see God's at work. I am so excited! I hope you are excited too while praying for Uptick NABWU, and should God lead you to contribute financially we'll know that you can see and support this "NEW THING!"

Moreen Sharp, a Canadian and president of the North American Baptist Women's Union (NABWU) and a vice president of the Baptist World Alliance Women's Department (BWAWD), has been appointed Interim Executive Director of the BWA Women's Department. Moreen currently volunteers part-time as BWAWD Acting Executive Director and will become full time Interim Executive Director after her five-year term is completed with NABWU in October. Her new appointment lasts until July 2020. She succeeds Patsy Davis who retired December 31, 2015, after working as BWAWD Executive Director for 17 years.

Moreen has had longstanding involvement in women's ministry. From 2008-2010, she was president of Women in Focus, the Women's Department for Canadian Baptists of Western Canada. During that time she was also on the boards of Canadian Baptist Ministries, Canadian Baptist Women and NABWU. Currently, she is a member of the BWA General Council and the Commission on Human Rights Advocacy, as well as the Executive Committee of the North American Baptist Fellowship.

She and her husband, Paul, have been ministry partners for more than 30 years in several countries. Moreen has led teaching, music and drama ministries in Japan, India and Canada. The couple has engaged in transitional pastoral ministry, serving various congregations in Canada on a short term basis. She is a graduate of Regent College, an international graduate school of theology in the City of Vancouver in Canada.

A presentation by John Chandler at that meeting, initiated several planning sessions focused on encouraging, equipping and empowering young women to extend their witness in general, and working with NABWU in particular.

With much anticipation, great preparation and a huge celebration, we fast forward to the formation of Uptick NABWU, meeting for their first huddle in February of 2017. We serve an awesome God who turned a struggle into NABWU's greatest stride, because we dared to dream. A collaboration, spearheaded by Ruby Fulbright, the VP of Networking & Leadership Development created a ministry model producing streams of living water. Attracting young women was once a test but is now a testimony. What was a burden has become a blessing that began with a simple invitation, because we dared to dream!

The bible says, ask and it shall be given! Over the last five years I have learned to appreciate the declaration, "what God brings you to...God will bring you through." Working with these extraordinary women of God, has helped to clarify my call and expand my ministerial focus. Every challenge I experienced was God's invitation to grow.
