PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

As part of our rebranding effort, we are re-emphasizing our determination for BWNA to be recognized as women of prayer, and not simply known as women that administer a day of prayer. Soon, you will be able to pray with women throughout North America on our weekly prayer call/digital meeting. We are looking forward to this collaborative venture that will allow us to pray for one another, share testimonies and intercede on behalf of persons in need. Additionally, this year we have adopted Isaiah 54-55 as the inspirational verses that we are using to ground BWNA projects, proposals, and collective prayers for this year. The key scriptures are Isaiah 54:2-4.

"Enlarge the place of your tent, stretch your tent curtains wide, do not hold back; lengthen your cords, strengthen your stakes. For you will spread out to the right and to the left; ... "Do not be afraid; you will not be put to shame. Do not fear disgrace; you will not be humiliated. You will forget the shame of your youth and remember no more the reproach of your widowhood."

This passage encourages and challenges BWNA to remain focused on growth and development, while utilizing every obstacle as a mechanism for improvement. Instead of simply centering our efforts on surviving, we are navigating our work and expectations towards thriving, through prayer, networking, resourcing and leadership development.

Please stay tuned for more opportunities that God is providing through BWNA to help women live out kingdom life, especially in the areas of helping the vulnerable.

BROADENING THE DAY OF PRAYER

BWNA is leading the global initiative to rebrand and expand the Baptist Women's World Day of Prayer.

We are not only seeking to do some things that are new, we are simultaneously aiming to remind ourselves, as Baptist women, of our organizational roots and reclaim the power of purpose of the original Baptist Women's Day of Prayer, which helped to foster reconciliation within the Body of Christ after the Second World War.

What we now know as the Baptist Women's World Day of Prayer began as a week of prayer that united women from many of the countries that were on opposing sides of the war. The following quote is taken from the 1948 statement of the women that attended the 1948 meeting in London. It was printed in *The Tie That Binds*. "Facing the world...today, with its need of faith, of hope, and of love, we turn to our Heavenly Father for purification, for guidance and for strength. He has great blessings in store for us which He is longing to give to us, but which can only be given to us in answer to our prayers...Let us, as European Baptist women, dedicate the first week in November as a week of prayer when we unitedly pray for each other and for all the world. Never is the fellowship deeper, richer and stronger than when we as one heart and soul are praying together."

Just as it was then, our world today is full of despair, injustice, suffering, poverty, and conflict. The divisions that constantly separate us into inimical stratifications of race, culture, age, political affiliation, and economic status, contradict the unity that we are called to have in the Body of Christ. - Traditional Prayer Events Conventional occasions that occur at churches and various public spaces. These locations will be advertised on the Day of Prayer Map at bwna.today so that persons can find it.
- Private Prayer Gatherings
 Intimate events, which are hosted at small locations, such as homes, libraries, or coffee shops. The city will be shared on the Day of Prayer map to acknowledge the gathering.

Prayer Stations

Open prayer tables (or booths) in public sites, such as college campuses, subway stations, or street corners, etc., where hosts offer prayer to anyone who wants it throughout the day. These stations utilize the Day of Prayer Kits and the locations will be posted on the Day of Prayer Map. AN INTERVIEW WITH JOY BOLTON

Joy Bolton is a former executive director, Kentucky Woman's Missionary Union (WMU), and current volunteer missions consultant with the Woman's Missionary Union of Southern Baptist Convention. For her, the path to becoming an active participant in the BWA-WD World Day of Prayer (DOP) began when she accompanied her parents to the Baptist World Alliance Congress at the tender age of twelve. Although she doesn't remember when she started to participate in the Day of Prayer she credits the experience at the BWA Congress for giving her an understanding of the global Baptist family, an interest in women's issues around the world and Baptist women around the world.

Awareness

According to Joy, her parents "influenced her perspective of being a world citizen and praying for Baptists in other places." Through the observance of the BWA-WD World Day of Prayer she learnt to be more aware of the challenges and issues women around the world face daily and this has given her a deep concern for our sisters around the world. She is ever so grateful to have the opportunity to pour into other women's lives through prayer and sacrificial giving on the Day of Prayer so that other women might experience the love of Christ in a tangible way.

Connection

Reflecting on how God used her in her past role with WMU to deepen her understanding of the challenges and issues of our Baptist sisters globally, Joy says: "Through my work with Woman's Missionary Union, I have had opportunity to participate in mission trips in Rwanda, Tanzania, Malawi (2x), South Africa, Swaziland, Kyrgyzstan, Romania, Poland, Brazil, South Korea (3x), Indonesia, Israel, and Puerto Rico. Because of these experiences, the prayer requests from the continental unions are very meaningful. I have met many of the leaders of the work among Baptist women. It has been meaningful to say to them, "I will be praying with you on the Baptist Women's Day of Prayer."

Community

Because of her personal connection made during mission trips, during the DOP observance she "visualizes Baptist sisters around the world and thinks of them as prayers for requests from each continental union is made." During a visit to Korea, Joy was impressed with how the Korean WMU train and encourage the women to participate in the Day of Prayer. As she listened to the Korean women pray aloud simultaneously, it gripped her heart to know they were all crying out to the Lord together.

Gratitude

Joy is not only blessed by the opportunity to meet many of our sisters around the world but is also "grateful for the Day of Prayer offering and how it is divided between the work of the continental unions and the BWA Women's Department. It is meaningful to be part of projects around the world led by Baptist sisters." She realizes that "offering grants are not large, but in all of these ministries, our giving makes a huge difference."

"Our prayers and sacrificial giving impact and change lives, it's sharing the gospel and meeting needs."

AN INTERVIEW WITH SHIRLEY MCDONALD Women's Missionary Union, Texas

Baptist Women's Day of Prayer is usually a grand day of prayer for the East Association Woman's Missionary Union. Women from the county Baptist churches who come are excited to think that women from all over the world are praying together on the same day. Yet, although the focus is prayer, the leadership team uses the prayer program Bible study and guide to share about the challenges and issues affecting our Baptist sisters in the seven Continental Unions. This is a big part of the celebration.



How the day is celebrated

Shirley McDonald shares that, "Sometimes there will be seven prayer tables at which participants can gather together to pray." The ladies have also engaged in a prayer walk. They displayed information about each Continental Union on the walls in the venue. The ladies then prayer-walked around the world learning about their sisters and praying for them.

Offering

The women have a keen interest in the Day of Prayer projects. "Every year, the women are excited to hear about the Day of Prayer Projects. We pray for the projects then take up an offering. The Bible encourages us to love one another. Giving an offering to support the Day Of Prayer projects and the work that women do around the world is a tangible way of showing love for our sisters around the world," Shirley declares. "Over the years, we have seen God at work opening the eyes of our ladies here in the United States to the many needs of women in the seven Continental Unions."

Praying throughout the year

In addition to praying and giving on the Day of Prayer, Shirley adds, "Our women continue to pray throughout the year." What a blessing to know that women are not only praying on that one day for their sisters around the world but they continue to lift these concerns to our Father in heaven. As she affirms: "We are so thankful that we can participate in the BWA Women's Day of Prayer."

Let us all join our sisters in Texas and continue to pray for the prayer items mentioned in the Day of Prayer program throughout the year. Our prayers are powerful when they are rooted in a righteous life.

2019 DAY OF PRAYER PROJECT GRANT RECIPIENTS

EXPENDABLE

Atlantic Baptist Women

This grant helps eXpendable raise awareness, especially among high school students, about the dangers of the sex trade, prostitution and human trafficking.

GRADE 3 TUTORING PROGRAM Women's Auxiliary, National Baptist

This project will help elementary school children, struggling and being held back in classes.

SURVIVE AND THRIVE General Baptist WMS

This project reaches out to single mothers and their children.

RESTORING HOPE

Women's Ministry, North American Baptist Conference Homeless and victimized women include victims of human trafficking and domestic abuse will be served through this project.

GOOD NEIGHBOURS

Women's Missionary Union, Texas

This grant supports two female graduates of Baptist Seminary as they work in community and leadership development.

CHRISTIAN WOMEN JOB

CORPS. OF GREATER ARLINGTON Women's Missionary Union, Texas

This project helps under-employed and unemployed women prepare for the job market.

BEAUTY INSIDE AND OUT (BIO) Atlantic Baptist Women

This project supports young women to leave the sex trade and helps those who have left.

RED CIRCLE YOUTH OUTREACH American Baptist Women's Ministries

This project focuses on disadvantaged high-risk youth who are 13 - 18 years old.

FRESH WAYS TO PRAY



MUSICAL PRAYERS

Have prayer requests written on cards and placed on the floor around a room. Play favorite worship hymns (traditional and contemporary) and when the music stops, each person goes to a card and prays about what is written on it. One of the group needs to be the music director for this exercise.



TEXT PRAYER GROUPS

People commit themselves to pray at a particular time and text each other as a reminder; or one of the group texts the others with a prayer or Bible text for reflection.



FRIDGE PRAYERS

Print prayer requests on a card, and add a magnet to each card. Hand out a card to each person to pray for during the Day of Prayer celebration. At the end of your time, ask women to take their cards home and place on their fridge and pray for this concern during the year.



EMAIL PRAYER GROUPS

Set up an email group and send each other prayer requests. Use our monthly prayer foci as a springboard or download and use the Day of Prayer prayer guide created by the Caribbean Baptist Women's Union.

PRAYER SPACES, SACRED SPACES



Set up a prayer room in your church and offer a variety of stations of prayer stations representing the Continental Unions. Place prayer requests from each continent around each station and have people move from station to station praying for the concerns mentioned.

Use candles (safely!) as a focus for silent prayer.

Have Bible passages on pieces of card for people to reflect on and then take away.

Use music - either to create an atmosphere for the whole prayer space, or through headphones for individual contemplation.

REMEMBERING THE WOMEN WHO WENT BEFORE US PEGGY BEAUFORD (1946 – 2018)

S ister Peggie Beauford was born on July 1, 1946 in Baltimore, Maryland, to the late Eloise Qullins-Carr. She was adopted and raised in Friendfield Community, near Effingham, South Carolina, by the late Benny and Rosa Williamson Edwards. She departed this life in service to her GOD and her church on Monday, November 5, 2018.

Peggie was educated at the Mt. Rona Grade School of Effingham and Gibbs School in Pamplico, South Carolina. She also attended Hampton University, Florence-Darlington Technical College, and the Southern Institute of Real Estate.

Peggie has been a member of Olive Grove Baptist Church of Coward, South Carolina, Mt. Rona Baptist Church of Effingham, South Carolina, and Wayside Baptist Church of Florence, South Carolina since the age of 14. At Wayside, she has served as member of the Junior Usher Board, Junior Choir, Baptist Training Union (BTU), Celestial Choir, Senior Choir, Youth Department, Mass Choir, Willing Workers, Planning Committee, Anniversary Committee, Culinary Committee, the Missionary Society, along with many different offices that are too numerous to name. She also served as a former Sunday School and Vacation Bible School teacher.

She faithfully served the women of the St. John's Women's Convention as Vice-President, and at the time of her demise, she was the current President.

A life-long educator of over 30 years, she retired from Florence School District One, having served in many capacities at Theodore Lester Elementary School. She also retired as a Real Estate Broker Manager of GKB&W Enterprise Real Estate of Florence.

Active in the life of her children, she served with pleasure as the Parent Teachers Association's President, Vice Pres-



ident, Secretary, and Treasurer at Timrod Elementary, Williams Middle and Wilson High Schools. She also was a member of the Wilson High School Choral Booster Club and the Wilson Marching Pride Band Booster Club.

Never meeting a stranger, she lived and worked for the benefit of others, treating everyone with love and respect. She worked tirelessly to be a vessel in changing lives for the better. She daily sought to fulfill what she knew was her God given purpose: to teach, encourage, serve GOD, and her community.

She leaves a rich legacy of leadership, love, and service with her children, grandchildren sisters, special relatives and all those she loved.

PEGGY BEAUFORD IN HER WORDS LABOR OF LOVE PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

"... When you help your fellow man when he is in need, that's a labor of love. When you give your offering to the church, that's a labor of love. When you come to choir rehearsal, sing the best you can and don't complain, that's a labor of love.

So many times we may find it hard to do what that little voice inside tells us to do, but remember: Labor of Love. My challenge today is for each one of us to do something GOOD, out of the ordinary for someone else and watch how it makes you feel. We might find ourselves smiling for absolutely no reason; we might feel a flutter of the heart that makes us laugh out loud; we might find that the problem we thought was going to take us out seems trivial.

What does the Scripture say?

Proverbs 16:31 says that grey-headedness is a crown of glory/beauty when it is found in the way of righteousness.

Job 12:12: With the ancient is wisdom; and the length of days is understanding.

You've heard the saying, "He called the old because of wisdom and understanding and the young because they are strong."

Seniors! Don't you get comfortable on the stool of do-nothing! Don't you let nobody push you aside! Don't you allow anybody to plant in your mind that you are no longer useful! You are the salt of the earth. Share your wisdom with your grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Make them put down the cell phone and tell them the days of old. Teach the young how to love one another. Jesus was willing to labor because God loved us. Labors of Love!"
